

What do you use WordPress for?

Why?

- allows you to integrate data + features from WordPress into any application
- build static sites/apps that just pull data in via ajax
- use WordPress as your data storage
- use the json format to transmit data to and from your site
- works with any language/platform as long as it can make HTTP requests





Jetpack/WP.com API


- Works with WP.com and Jetpack-enabled WP.org blogs
- All requests go through <u>public-api.wordpress.com</u>
- Uses oauth2 for authentication
- You need to register an application at developer.wordpress.com
- Insights/stats for each application
- Many real world implementations out there
- More mature and complete API


What can you do with the Jetpack API?

- User info & site info
- Create, edit, delete, find, reblog, and view posts (includes CPTs, post meta & media)
- Create, edit, delete, find, and view comments
- Search & related posts
- Taxonomies (categories/tags & custom ones too)
- Likes & following/subscribing to a blog

What can you do with the Jetpack API?

- WordPress.com Freshly Pressed content
- Notifications
- WP.com stats
- WP.com reader
- Your own app's insights
- Coming soon: Publicize, additional media capabilities, embeds/shortcodes; wp-admin feature parity






WP-API

- Backed by the core team
- Scheduled for release in core in a future version
- Great infrastructure/ecosystem
- WP-CLI integration
- No large scale implementations yet
- Uses cookies or oauth1 for authentication

What can you do with the WP-API?

- Retrieve and create/update site info, posts, users, taxonomies, comments, post meta, revisions, media
- Truly RESTful (uses GET, POST, PUT, DELETE for different operations)
- Typical route is /wp-json/**object**/**id**
- Expandable via hooks and filters

Both APIs have a console where you can simulate requests and inspect the results that each produce.


